





hat an incredible fall term we've had thus far at Thomas More University. In August, we saw yet another record enrollment, welcoming 448 new students to our community and welcoming back 825 returning students. This returning number is significant as it represents an 84.7% persistence rate, the highest retention rate the University has ever seen. This

is truly a testament to the incredible work of our faculty and our staff, as we have remained steadfast in our commitment to increase retention and persistence rates towards graduation for all students. Our outreach across the globe has also increased with record international enrollment, as we welcomed students from Mexico, Spain, Italy, Argentina, the Netherlands, Germany, the United Kingdom, Kenya, and Panama this fall.

September was a particularly exciting month in the history of Thomas More University, with the celebration of our centennial anniversary. Throughout this magazine you will see photos and highlights of the wonderful events that took place to kickoff our 100th year as an institution. The home football game, fireworks, centennial Mass, founders' day reception, academic convocation, campaign kickoff, and the inaugural Saints Serve were wonderful celebrations, but the pictures can hardly do justice to the contagious and palpable spirit of community that permeated throughout the weekend. The celebrations are far from over, as we will continue to honor the centennial for the rest of the year.

As we took careful time to honor the legacy of the Benedictine Sisters, who founded Villa Madonna College, and the Sisters of Notre Dame and the Congregation of Divine Providence who joined in 1929 to assist with the administration and teaching for the institution, it was equally important to look forward and begin our second century with a new and bold vision for the future of Thomas More University. On Sept.13, we kicked off the Second Century Campaign: It's time for More. This \$30 million comprehensive capital campaign is the most ambitious fundraising initiative in University history and is directly tied to supporting the goals of the new Strategic Plan: Lighting the Way, which we announced in the Spring 2021 Moreover issue. I am thrilled to report, that we are more than 50% to our goal already, with more than \$15.7 million in commitments to the campaign. We are well on our way to funding the various projects in the campaign, including the construction of a new academic center, the relocation, enhancement, and construction of new athletic facilities, which will support our plans to join the NCAA Division II, and to grow the endowment, which has increased over the past two years from \$23 million to \$35 million today.

I want to thank all the alumni and friends who have been so supportive of my time as president. I am thrilled to tell you that the Board of Trustees has invited me to extend my contract by an additional five years. On behalf of my wife Laura, and my children Colin and Emma, we are so grateful to be a part of the Thomas More family.



A Celebration 100 Years in the Making



Sept. 12 marked the official centennial anniversary date when Villa Madonna College held its first class. In 2021 events took place from Sept. 11-14, to commemorate an amazing start to a year's worth of celebrating!

Thomas More's centennial celebration kicked off with a collective series of events commemorating the 100th anniversary of the University over the weekend of Sept. 11-14, 2021. The Thomas More community, including students, faculty, staff, alumni and friends of the University, marked the festive occasion with signature

events that gave a nod to and celebrated the treasured past while looking to the future.

The action started on Saturday, Sept. 11, 2021, with the Saints

season home opener football game under the lights at Republic Bank Field versus the Faulkner University Eagles of Alabama. It was the first home game that allowed guests in the stands and tailgating areas since the pandemic hit in 2020. There were pre-game festivities as President Chillo welcomed and honored active military, veterans, and first responders, most of whom were alumni or family members of active students and alums. This was done in recognition of the 20th anniversary of 9/11 and as acknowledgement of the continuing relationship the University has had with the military since 1945 when the return of World War II veterans and passage of the G.I. Bill marked the beginning of co-education at Villa Madonna College, and in 1947 the introduction of athletic programs. The evening culminated with a spectacular Rozzi's fireworks display above Mary, Seat of Wisdom Chapel.

Sept. 12, 1921, marked the official date when the Sisters of St. Benedict welcomed seven young women entering the convent to classes at Villa Madonna College with the goal of preparing them for teacher certification. Present day Sept. 12 began with Mass at the Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington, the original "chapel" for important occasions when the University was located in downtown Covington. Bishop Roger J. Foys, D.D., who also served as Thomas More's chancellor for 19 years, was the celebrant. Concelebrants included Thomas More faculty members Monsignor Gerald E. Twaddell, D.Phil., and Reverend Ray Enzweiler, Ph.D., BeL. It was a beautiful ceremony, with members of the Thomas More community making up a large contingent. All those present to celebrate the Mass gave thanks for the many blessings God has bestowed on the University and to pray for His continued grace in the future. Immediately





aking inroads into the permanent collection at Thomas More has been a rewarding project and since the spring Moreover, four additional episodes have been produced. Of these four episodes, two are collections of work by the same artist and one is the great outdoors. I hope you enjoy this continuation of the coverage of Thomas More's permanent art collection.

1. The Darrell Brothers Collection

Darrell Brothers was a beloved member of the faculty at Thomas More for more than 25 years. His collection features artwork created in the '70s that were gifted to the University upon his death in 1993. One of the pieces in the collection features Brothers along with his former students, now colleagues, Dan Mader '71 and Bernie Schmidt '58. Both Mader and Schmidt became chairmen of art departments at other local institutions. This interview features the reflections of both Dan Mader '71 and Monsignor William Cleves. 

Saints Spotlight spoke with Courtney Smalley, who was instrumental in helping with the overhaul of the Thomas More University website.

Can you describe your experience at Thomas More?

CS: I was a traditional four year student at Thomas More, and I double majored in creative writing and Spanish, so I'm very much a language person, which helps in my current role building websites. I was the managing editor of the Words literary journal for a couple of years, which I really enjoyed. The thing that really stands out to me when I think about my time at Thomas More is just how I felt like such an important member of the community. The professors and the staff really treated me like an equal, like they wanted to hear my perspective, and they were open and eager to learn things from me, which stood out to me from my first visit to campus. That's one of the things that sets Thomas More apart. I loved my time there.

Tell us about your work at USDP and what you find rewarding.

CS: I am an account manager, which means that I get to be a client liaison, and also project manage our internal teams to get work done. It's a really fun position because I get to work with so many different types of clients and understand some of the key elements of their businesses or organizations. I get an inside look into different industries that I never in a lifetime of career transitions would be able to do even if I job-hopped like every year. So that's really fun. I've gotten to work on websites for a lot of government and nonprofit organizations, from a small office of NASA to our local board of elections. I also just really love getting to work with our team here, because I've been super lucky and have found

another place, like Thomas More, where we all really value the unique things that each one of us brings to the table, and are really focused on helping each other grow and building each other up.

Where do you see yourself in five, 10, or 15 years?

CS: I don't have a concrete vision for that necessarily, I just know

that I want to keep following what I'm excited about or what I'm curious about and where God seems to be inviting me in my life. That's how I've moved through life to this point and it's just been beautiful, it's been perfect. Not that my life has been perfect but the journey, I don't think I would change anything at all. I'm really focusing right now on learning how to listen to God's voice inside of my heart because he's the one who has our hearts. If I can just keep following that and stay really connected to myself and to God and to my community. Really just continuing to find ways to use my very unique perspective and skills to help the people around me, which I think is what ultimately fulfills any human being, when you - your unique authentic self - are valuable to the people around you.

Do you have any advice for current students?

CS: Yes, my advice is very simple. I think it's just to keep being your true self, the most honest version of yourself because the world needs you. The world does not need anyone else's version of you. So that's my advice.

2. INTO THE URBAN FABRIC

Welcoming the opportunity to get back into the community, professor JT Spence's Urban Studies class visited three sites in the Cincinnati metro area to explore the city from a distance and up-close. They first examined the urban landscape from the vantage points of Devou Park in Covington and Mt. Adams in Cincinnati. The class then explored Fountain Square in downtown Cincinnati. Questions were posed regarding the natural and built environments and a reflection paper was written to connect their experiences in the urban setting with assigned readings. 3. NASA GRANTS FUND STUDENT RESEARCH

Professor of physics Wes Ryle, Ph.D., applied for and received grants from the NASA Kentucky Space Grant Program to fund two Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) projects. The grants will provide a stipend for Ashlyn Coleman (junior physics/math double major) and Lindsay Dawson (sophomore math major/physics minor) to conduct research at the observatory over the academic year and present their work at a research conference in the spring. Ashlyn's project includes observations of eclipsing binary star systems to determine stellar masses, temperature, and size. Lindsay is collecting data on pulsating variable stars for use in an interactive undergraduate laboratory program.

4. THE RETURN OF CAMP SUMMIT

Student Life and the Institute for Career Development and Graduate School Planning welcomed back Camp Summit after a 2020 hiatus due to COVID-19. Eight student mentors welcomed 52 incoming first-year students to a three-day retreat that helps develop a deeper understanding of Thomas More, resources available, and the culture between students, staff, and faculty. One participant describes their favorite part of the experience: "The connections I made with people in my group and other groups. I can honestly say I met my best friend and someone I really connected with during this camp and we hang out every day now."



SAINTS SPOTLIGHT

Bruce Rosenthal, Ph.D. **Dean of the College of Business**

Saints Spotlight spoke with the new dean of the College of Business about his goals and vision as he began his first academic year at Thomas More. Rosenthal has more than 25 years of higher education experience which includes more than 17 years in academic leadership. Before making the jump into higher education, he was a business person and spent several years overseas, both in Europe and Asia, where he found a passion for Japanese culture and became fluent in both written and spoken Japanese. He relies on his extensive business background to help determine his direction as a leader in higher education, but he also has a creative side, having spent time during his undergrad in illustration and advertising.

What has influenced your views of business?

BR: All of the experiences that I had as a business person, both as an entrepreneur and working for major corporations, have shaped how I feel about business. Having all this experience, I am able to sympathize with younger people starting off in business: what they need to know, what they probably don't need to know, the kinds of things that are going to be important to them, the kinds of things they're going to be called upon to do. I certainly want to be able to put these very reality based and strongly experience-oriented courses and experiences and opportunities into the College of Business so that Thomas More College of Business graduates are extremely well prepared to take their place in the business world and make positive impacts not only in their own careers, but in their communities and with the organizations in which they work.

What business topics do you find most fascinating and enjoy discussing?

BR: A lot of the business discussions recently have been about how the world is going to change because of COVID-19, how the world is becoming more globalized, what skills are needed and what skills will probably be most important in the next 10-to-20 years, as well as what kinds of education we should be providing students being that most estimates are that many of our students will be working in fields that don't exist yet. Not subjects that don't exist, fields that don't exist yet and so a lot of the discussion circles around, 'well then how are we effectively educating our students, if they have to go into fields that don't exist, we don't know what they (the fields) are.' I'm involved in putting together an advisory council for the College of Business, and those are the kinds of questions that I want to ask local and regional business leaders. What do you think we ought to be teaching? What's going to be helpful to you? What is it that a student could put on a CV that you would look at and say, "Well, that's interesting. Tell me more about that." Those are the kinds of courses and the kinds of experiences that we will provide for our students so that when you, Mr. Employer/Ms. Employer, see this student, you're going to look at them and say, "Well that's the kind of person that I want in this organization!"

Do you have concrete goals?

BR: There are a couple of things that I think are going to be of major importance to business people. One of them is sustainability. Companies who do sustainability well, and work within sustainability paradigms and examples, are going to be most successful. The companies that are using outdated technology or Thomas More University



clinging to processes that were perfectly fine 50, 60, 70 years ago, those are the ones that are going to fall by the wayside. The saying goes, "The Stone Age didn't end because people ran out of stone. The Stone Age ended because better technology came along," and there are better technologies that are more green, socially responsible, environmentally responsible, innovative, save time, energy, capital and these are the kinds of directions that most businesses, certainly the major businesses, are going to be heading towards. If you look at the websites of two of the major employers in this area, Kroger and Procter & Gamble, sustainability is all over them. They are very concerned with sustainable practices and if we are not teaching our students what that means, then we're doing them a disservice. Interestingly enough, very few universities in the United States are focusing on sustainability in business, but I want that as a major thrust of what we're doing. Other directions are things such as experientially based courses and concepts - for example negotiation persuasion. That was something that as a business person I had to do literally every day. Another aspect that I think we need to concentrate on is something that every major company lists as an essential skill, almost no university teaches it, and that's creativity. I teach a course on creativity and innovative thinking and I certainly do want to introduce that on the undergraduate level at Thomas More but I also want to make it part of how we are educating our students from the deep roots part up so that local companies and regional companies will look at what we're doing at Thomas More College of Business and say, "Okay, those guys get it."

What is your advice for Thomas More students?

BR: Find what you're really interested in, and pursue that; it could be anime, it could be cooking, it could be the restaurant business, it could be tourism, it could be travel, it could be marketing. Business is a fascinating thing to get into because it literally affects every other human activity. The example that I give to artists, because I am an artist, Vincent van Gogh died basically alone in an attic. Picasso died a fabulously wealthy man in a castle that he owned to the south of France, and it wasn't because Picasso was that much better of an artist than Vincent van Gogh. The man knew how to market himself. To the extent that you can, my advice ... is to pick something that's fun for you; it makes a tremendous difference in how you approach life and how you approach your work.

Open Educational Resources benefit or boon?

he academic leadership team and faculty at Thomas More University investigated the use of Open Educational Resources (OER) during the spring semester of 2020. Adopting

Garriga

OER advances equity and accessibility for students, facilitates curricular adaptations through the customization of course materials, and promotes sustainability efforts at educational institutions. When faculty members adopt OERs, students see a direct reduction in course material costs. Of course, the adoption of OER resources involves many stakeholders: faculty, academic support offices, academic leaders, librarians, and instructional designers.

Ideally, OERs are first adopted for lower-division core curriculum courses that impact a large number of students. In recent national dean group discussions, physics, anatomy and physiology, mathematics, English, history, and political science have proven early adopters. At Thomas More University, however, the department of psychology has taken the lead on the

development of OERs.

In summer 2021, the psychology faculty piloted the use of an OER text for two general psychology courses. The department has focused on choices that are free to students, of high quality, accessible, that

provide teaching resources (PowerPoints and test banks), are customizable, and easily integrated with Canvas (Thomas More's learning management system).

The choices were narrowed to Openstax and Noba. Both are free and highly rated on accessibility and Canvas integration. Each of them provides options for students to print a physical copy of the text for a low cost and also provide a pdf version of the text for free. Textbook chapters could be directly linked in Canvas without requiring students to log into an external site.

One downside to both Noba and Openstax was that their testing banks each needed tweaking and expansion. Ultimately, the psychology faculty chose Noba because it was slightly more customizable,

OER - what is it?

OER or Open Educational Resources are digital contents used for teaching/learning purposes. They are released under open intellectual property licenses to enable their free use or repurposing. These resources may include full courses of academic programs or specific learning materials such as textbooks, lessons, lectures, assessments, and tests.

and the text was written by high-profile psychologists and created specifically for the discipline.

Looking forward, psychology aims to create a Canvas resource for those faculty members using the OER text that allows for instructions on how to customize textbooks and test banks. The plan is to add to existing test banks and build video resources and online activities all instructors can access and use. Ultimately, while OER texts can be harder to set up, they provide high-quality textbooks at no cost to Thomas More University students. Assessing the impact of OER adoption will be key to expanding use of OERs in other courses. We hope that more departments will explore OER resources in future.

Austin Corsmeier '16 Alumnus | Faculty

Austin Corsmeier is a nursing alum and now a faculty member in the Nursing Program. He is also the recipient of the Outstanding Traditional Undergraduate Faculty award for 2021a great honor for such a young professor. We caught up with Austin to hear what he has to say about his Thomas More experience.

What was it like for you as a nursing student?

AC: It was empowering to be a student of Thomas More. I tend to think of myself as someone who was a little more introverted by nature but Thomas

More allowed me to find my voice. I learned to harness the ability to think in a way in which you simply don't accept all arguments and conclusions you are exposed to, but rather you have an attitude involving questioning such arguments and conclusions. I was exposed to Thomas More's commitment to integrity, concern for justice, and service to others, all which our patron Saint Thomas More is so justly renowned for. As a student, I was challenged to experiment boldly, to learn to hear myself, to find what feels true, to find clarity, to remove the noise, and to ultimately use my voice. It was very empowering.

Is there anything in particular that you feel contributed to your success as a student and even now, as a faculty member?


AC: I have always been extremely fortunate to have strong mentors and a strong support system. My immediate family has always pushed me to be the best version of myself possible but this pushing was never forced or demanding. It was always done with the highest amount of love and support that you could imagine. Once you have that type of underpinning, that type of foundation, it becomes easy to push yourself and to achieve. I can extend that same sentiment to the (Thomas More) professors and to a wide variety of people in my life.

Which professors were your favorites?

AC: Now you're putting me on the spot because they're all (my) colleagues! First and foremost, I have to give the utmost praise to the entire nursing faculty. I feel like I have been able to take elements from each of them both from an academic perspective and from a clinical perspective, and apply it into my own practice. For example, Dr. (Rebeca) Tacy - she truly pushed me in a way to think critically about each and every patient scenario, and to begin to connect the dots between academic knowledge and actual clinical practice. Dr. (Lisa) Torok was my advisor and instrumental to my success. I still view her as one of my greatest mentors. Moving away from the nursing department, Dr. Cate Sherron. She instilled my love for ethics, morality, and philosophy; all of which are things that I now try to tie into my own courses. Her teaching style was very collaborative and inquisitive, and it was philosophically challenging, which I admired. And lastly, I have to give credit to Dr. (Maria C.) Garriga and Dr. (Julie) Luebbers. I actually obtained a Spanish minor (from Thomas More) as well. Each of them had a classroom environment that was very organic and natural and immersive, and they both always challenged me to push beyond my comfort zone.

AC: Our nursing students are goal-oriented and optimistic. There is no doubt that college, and nursing school in particular, can be challenging. I see my students look for solutions and they keep moving forward. I've seen them connect with their professors and their classmates, I've seen them make the most out of that educational experience. Last but not least, they're definitely passionate. They realize that at the end of the day, their passion is what will drive them to be successful. Their love for the nursing field and desire to care holistically for patients clearly puts them in a position to pursue a very rewarding career after graduation. most nursing students join the profession to help others. Although, some experiences they have can be highly stressful, whether it's patient situations or maybe being looked down upon by other healthcare workers. We need to always strive to provide a supportive environment **MOREOVER** because I really do think that's a prerequisite for learning.





Saints Spotlight interviewed Yvan Demosthenes, one of the investors of Dead Low Brewing, the brewery that crafted Saintenni-ale for the $100^{\rm th}$ anniversary celebration. Yvan also happens to be an alumnus, adjunct professor, and member of the Alumni Board.

Can you give us a short history behind your career path?

YD: I started school in 1987 at the University of Cincinnati and my undergrad was biology/ natural sciences. I thought that I was going to follow in my father and uncle's footsteps and go into medical school but other things began to interest me. I had a friend who owned a chain of furniture stores, Rowe Showplace, with stores throughout Cincinnati. During my time helping him out, working with him on the floor, I became very interested in the behavior of the customers that would walk into the showroom. From that point on, my sales-interested curiosity just took over. In my heart I feel like I'm a salesperson so that's where my entrée into the business world started. I must say too, my father is a psychiatrist, so when I started realizing how sales is really connecting with the customers and their buying cues, etc., it just fascinated me. I went on to General Electric, where I was part of their team in their intelli-center that was part

of their selling IT hardware and software. Our team consisted of a lot of people who were longtime salespeople in the industry, and while I was there I impressed a few people. I had a supervisor who tapped me on the shoulder one day and shared with me how and why he was impressed by me. He strongly suggested that I obtain my MBA. That was the only thing holding me back because I had more of a science background and not the business acumen behind my sales. As I was researching MBA programs, I came upon Thomas More's TAP program (now the Digital, Graduate, & Professional program) and it was really a very convenient program for me on a couple of different levels; number one, it was down the street from our office. Also at the time, TAP had a cohort model and that really appealed to me; having a class that you carry through the whole program resonated with me. So that really helped me with my career path, opening doors for a lot of things and my sales skills and opportunities within companies continued to grow. I will tell you that, after attaining my MBA, getting some wins within the organizations that I served and worked for, my entrepreneurial spirit kept on bubbling to the surface. As my career started to progress and achieve success, attaining different accolades, the entrepreneurial call just kept on knocking on the door for me.

As an entrepreneur, what current projects and interests are you working on?

YD: My company Hamilton Demo is a certified veteran-owned company. We specialize in recruiting, executive search and placement, as well as project work around the recruiting talent acquisition/human capital space. We serve Fortune 500 companies, as well as small- and medium-sized companies. Actually, that's where our growth is right now. We're going on four years as an organization. My business partner and I have been really lucky in positioning ourselves here in the tristate but we've also made connections throughout the country. I'm also glad to say that we help nonprofits as well, especially when they're looking for executive directors, executive leadership type roles.

What was the biggest challenge you found with going back to school?

YD: Just making sure that I was able to fit my work and life with the commitment to attain the MBA. Also, as I mentioned, having the cohort model really helped me, my instincts were correct, because it was such a supportive group. All the apprehension and concerns I had, after a couple months, disappeared.

Do you have any advice for current students or anyone who's considering going back to school?

YD: If you're thinking about going back to school, 100% do it. Talk to your family, let them know what you're thinking, and also don't take it for granted that all schools and programs are alike. They aren't, try to find the best match for you. Looking back, I'm so grateful that I went through TAP because that was the exact program I needed at the exact time.



After a successful visit Dear Thomas More community, in June, Thomas More University has been unanimously approved for provisional membership in the Great Midwest Athletic Conference (G-MAC) as we are officially preparing our application for membership to the

As a key strategic initiative in the new strategic plan (Lighting the Way), we have spent the better part of the past year assessing this opportunity as we want to ensure that our student-athletes have the very best NCAA Division II. experience while we enhance the regional position of the University. The decision to join the G-MAC and apply for NCAA DII membership will greatly assist our efforts as we look to bolster our academic and

Over the next six months, the University will prepare a comprehensive feasibility study to further assess this athletic reputation in the region. opportunity. Once completed, the University will prepare its application for membership to the NCAA Division II by no later than February 1, 2022. If approved to enter the NCAA Division II membership process, the University will become a provisional member of the G-MAC for the 2022-23 academic year but will continue to compete in the NAIA for that period of time. We will conclude our NAIA membership at the end of the 2022-23 academic year and will complete two remaining years as provisional members of the G-MAC and the NCAA. Starting in the 2023-24 academic year, the University will compete in the G-MAC and will be eligible for conference championships and tournaments. Upon successful completion of the NCAA Division II membership process, the University would be able to compete in NCAA tournaments starting in the 2025-26 academic year.

There are many details that still require our attention as we continue to do our due diligence. This is an exciting opportunity for the University and our students. As always, I appreciate your support of our studentathletes, our athletic program, and the University.

Lacrosse expands

Addition of men's team, men's and women's coaching hires announced

resident Chillo and Athletic Director Terry Connor announced in summer 2021 the addition of men's lacrosse to the athletic offerings at Thomas More. Sean McGinnis was tapped to become the first men's full-time lacrosse coach and Pat Thatcher will take on the role of full-time women's lacrosse coach.

McGinnis earned his Bachelor of Science in sports medicine and communication from Ashland University and his Master of Education in sports management and exercise science from Cleveland State University. He comes to Thomas More after an eight-year stint at Archbishop Moeller High School where he led the men's lacrosse team to the Division 1 state championship in 2017 and helped grow the program from 55 to 80 players. During his tenure the team achieved a program GPA of 3.5 and saw over 25 student-athletes reach the collegiate level.

"I would like to thank President Chillo and Athletic Director Terry Connor for this great opportunity to become the first men's lacrosse coach at Thomas More," says McGinnis. "Starting this program at an athletic-rich university with an outstanding tradition of academics gives tri-state area high school students an opportunity to stay close to home to continue their academic and athletic pursuits." McGinnis explains that his "goal is to attract the best local talent in the tristate area and help grow the game of lacrosse in the







Northern Kentucky region. We want to establish a culture of winning, serving, and leadership."

Women's coach Thatcher earned his bachelor's degree in recreation and fitness from Northern Kentucky University and his master's degree of

special education from Mount St. Joseph University. Since 2012 he has served as the director of Fellowship of Christian Athletes Lacrosse where he grew and established the club lacrosse ministry in Southwest Ohio. Thatcher also worked as the athletic performance coach for Anderson High School from 2004-2020.

"The opportunity to become the first full-time women's lacrosse coach at Thomas More is exciting and humbling at the same time," says Thatcher. "I am looking forward to strengthening and developing the women's lacrosse program and helping put Thomas More lacrosse on the map. I want to build a strong leadership culture that will consist of a close-knit team that develops into a family, building on what is already a strong community."

Women's lacrosse resumes intercollegiate play in the spring of 2022. The men's program will compete as a club sport and transition to intercollegiate play in the spring 2023 season.

He brings over 30 years of coaching experience at the high school and collegiate level during which time he has produced four Division I state titles at Colerain, 22 All-State athletes, and helped produce the first ever women's cross country team member (Annabel Clayton) to reach nationals at Thomas More.

Congratulations to the 309 student-athletes in 2021 who carried a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher for the academic year. In the spring semester 332 student-athletes made the honor roll with a 3.0 or higher GPA and 183 made the dean's list with a 3.5 GPA or higher. All together the teams carry a 3.13 cumulative GPA. Women's cross country led the way with the highest overall team GPA of 3.72 and for men's sports, the cross country team led the way with a 3.34 GPA for the spring semester.

he Diocese of Covington celebrated the ordination and installation of Most Reverend John C. Iffert as the 11th Bishop of the Diocese of Covington on Sept. 30, 2021, at the Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption. Those in attendance included bishops, clergy, religious, and lay faithful with Archbishop Joseph Kurtz, of Louisville, as the principal consecrator. Bishop Roger Foys, 10th Bishop of Covington and Bishop Michael McGovern of Belleville served as co-consecrators. Archbishop Christophe Pierre, apostolic nuncio (the pope's representative) to the United States, was present to witness the ordination and installation.

Bishop Iffert is a native of DuQuoin, Illinois, and was ordained to the priesthood on June 7, 1997. He served as a parish priest and was on several diocesan posts and councils for the Diocese of Belleville, including vicar forane of first the east and then the north central vicariate; co-vicar for priests; the college of consultors, the Presbyteral council, the priest personnel board, the diocesan finance council, the Catholic Service and Ministry Appeal board, and the board of directors of Camp Ondessonk. Iffert was serving as the vicar general and moderator of the curia of the Diocese of Belleville when he was appointed bishop of Covington on July 13, 2021. At his ordination, he prayed that, "Together we will implore God's mercy on this local Church and pray that I may be sealed and transformed — consecrated — to become a shepherd after the heart and pattern of Jesus the Good Shepherd and his devoted Apostles."

A SEAT OF SOLACE

Recently the old rocking chair in my room with a wayward spring was replaced by a new rocker. As I looked at different styles I thought about the wooden rocker at my parents' house, the glider in the community room, even the rocking chairs while waiting to get into Cracker Barrel. I thought about replacing the old rocker with a different type of chair but came back again and again to the wooden legs and rhythm of rocking back and forth.

Rocking chairs have long been a refuge in my life through different homes and circumstances. The soothing rhythm slows my breathing and grounds me. Rocking chairs remind me of conversations in the living rooms of friends or talking on porches into the twilight hours. Rockers provided seats of healing following surgery or recovery from illness.

Since I've been working from home due to the pandemic I often pray in the morning from my rocker, a hot cup of coffee close at hand. It is where I bring to God my gratitude, my searching, and all which plays and sometimes weighs heavy upon my heart. My prayer recently is messy and often bears petitions and questions which are not quickly resolved. Even in the mess, I rock and I'm soothed, my trust reinforced that God is there listening and at work in ways I cannot yet imagine.

We each need a space to go where we can find solace and grounding. That space often comes to represent something much bigger and broader than the physical space in which we dwell.
